


Patrick A. Scott is director of music & organist at Grace-St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Memphis. There, he serves as the artistic director for the Memphis Boy & Girl Choir, provides music for chapel services for the Grace-St. Luke's School, plans an annual concert series, and leads a program supporting multiple choirs, including a chorister program affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music. He is also adjunct professor of organ at the University of Memphis. Prior to his appointment in Memphis, Dr. Scott served for five years at the Cathedral of St. Philip in Atlanta as Organist & Associate Choirmaster, playing for services and Evensongs and leading the RSCM-affiliated chorister program. A native of Picayune, Mississippi, he holds a bachelor of music degree in organ performance from Birmingham-Southern College, where he studied

with Dr. James Cook. As a student of Drs. Judith and Gerre Hancock, Patrick earned an MM degree in organ performance and sacred music and a DMA degree in organ performance, both from the University of Texas at Austin. His other major teachers have been Betty Polk and Kathy Vail.

Dr. Scott is recognized as one of the prominent organists of his generation, having won both the first prize and the audience prize in the AGO National Competition in Organ Improvisation held at the National Convention in Boston in 2014. At the same convention, he was also awarded second prize in the Schoenstein Hymn-Playing Competition. In 2016 he was named one of the top 20 leaders and organists under the age of 30 by *The Diapason* magazine. He has recorded CDs under the Raven and Gothic labels with the cathedral choirs of the Cathedral of St. Philip, Atlanta, and as soloist on the Aeolian-Skinner organ of Providence United Methodist Church in Charlotte, North Carolina, the organ formerly at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. While a student at UT Austin, Patrick was selected to join the Maymester Study Abroad program to explore the Anglican choral tradition of boy and girl choirs at chapels and cathedrals in Cambridge, London, Oxford, and Winchester, England.

An active recitalist and accompanist, Dr. Scott has appeared in concert and with choirs throughout the United States, as well as in France, Scotland, England, and Ireland. He has presented recitals, workshops, hymn festivals, and masterclasses for chapters and conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Organ Historical Society, the American Choral Directors Association, the Royal School of Church Music, and the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. He has served on the staff of four summer courses for the Royal School of Church Music. He has been heard on the *Pipedreams Live!* and *PipeWorks* radio programs. Prior to his appointment in Memphis, he served churches in Atlanta, Charlotte, Austin, and Tuscaloosa.

### **DEAN-ELECT**



Though now retired, **Don Marler** was the minister of music at West End United Methodist Church in Nashville for 36 years. He holds degrees from Indiana University (MM degree in organ performance and church music with a cognate field in conducting) and Southern Illinois University (BM degree in organ performance and K–12 choral music education).

After establishing a comprehensive music ministry in suburban Los Angeles, he came to Nashville, where he established a growing program at WEUMC that included children, youth, and adults. While there, his adult choir took nine tours of Europe and sang for national, regional, and state conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the

American Guild of English Handbell Ringers, the American Choral Directors Association, and the Fellowship of United Methodists.

Having been active in several professional organizations, he has served in multiple capacities. He has twice been dean of the Nashville AGO Chapter, as well as serving on the Executive Committee several times. Additionally, two times he was chair of the committee that oversaw the rewriting of the Operational Procedures for the Nashville chapter. Don also served on the Area VI Board of Directors of the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers for twelve years, including two as chair, and as member of the national board.



**Ken Varner** is music associate/church organist at Nashville First Baptist Church. He previously served Baptist churches in South Carolina and Florida, as well as in Memphis. He has been dean of the Greenville (SC) AGO Chapter, as well as sub-dean of the Orlando and Memphis chapters. He has a BM degree in organ performance from Furman University, a BA degree in education from the University of South Carolina, and an MA degree in teaching music from Rollins College. He is also a published arranger with Lillenas/Lorenz Publishing Company.

### **TREASURER**

**Joyce Byrd** has a BME degree from Murray State University with a major in piano and a minor in English. She taught choral music and English in Kentucky public schools, taught private piano for several years, served as organist at Crievewood Baptist for 40 years, and served as state keyboard clinician. She was also accompanist for Belmont University's Oratorio Chorus for several years. Joyce has been a member of the Nashville AGO Chapter since 1991. She has been secretary for a regional convention, chapter treasurer, and treasurer for the 2012 AGO National Convention in Nashville.

Her call to full-time ministry came after several years of teaching middle school band. She moved to Boston to attend Boston University's School of Theology and earned her master of sacred music degree with an emphasis in choral conducting in 2000. She has served in full-time music ministry for the past 22 years in several United Methodist congregations—from Maryland to Ohio to Iowa, and now in Nashville.

enjoys spending time in Warner Park, walking his dog (Banjo), and learning to play octave mandolin. He has been a member of the AGO for about 20 years.



Malcolm Matthews holds a DMA degree in organ performance and the artist's certificate from the Eastman School of Music. 
